

THE CALETA HOTEL

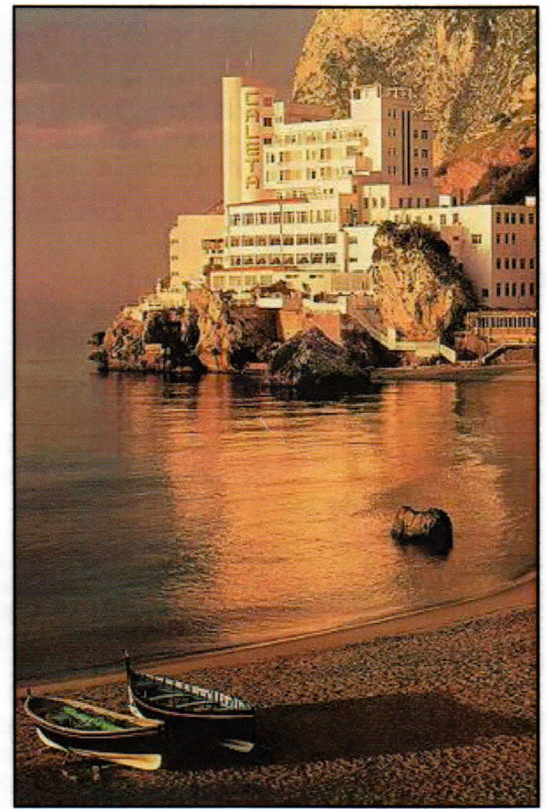
The Caleta is a classic hotel that still retains its inimitable charm, yet thanks to ongoing refurbishment has ensured that it offers comforts and facilities that are fully up to date.

Nestled on the eastern cliffs of the Rock the Caleta enjoys a unique position perched high above the sea with magnificent views to the north East and mainland Spain. The accommodation at the Caleta Hotel comprises of a mixture of sea facing deluxe rooms and apartments and land facing multi occupancy rooms. Charmingly decorated and spacious, they all include comfortable bathrooms with bath/shower, blow dryer and toiletry sets, while the rooms feature mini bar, satellite flat screen television, ceiling fan, telephone and room service.

Designed with both business and recreational visitors in mind, the accommodation offers excellent value. Vistas include close-up views of the famous Rock, but not surprisingly the most sought after rooms face the sea, their spacious terraces offering open, uncluttered views of the Mediterranean.

All rooms have tea and coffee making facilities and the deluxe rooms also have personal safes. "As the leading four star hotel in Gibraltar, the Caleta offers high quality and excellent value for sports teams". As befits a quality hotel, the Caleta offers a good choice of venues, be it for dining or a relaxing drink in convivial surroundings. Group transport will depart Malaga as follows:

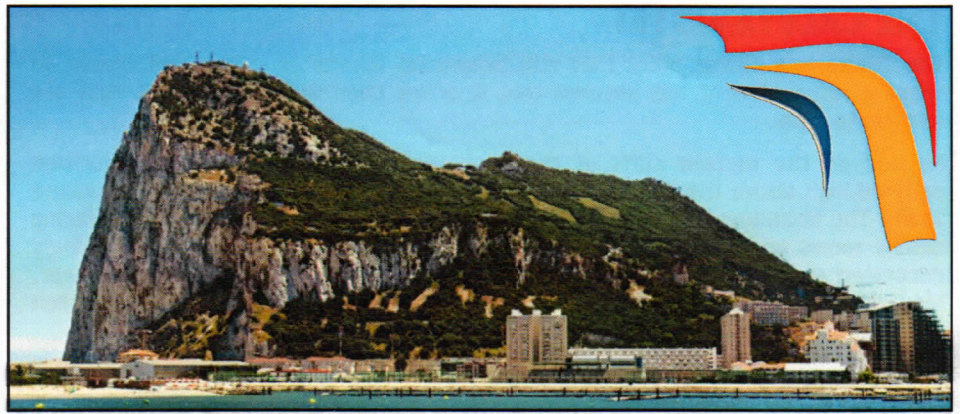
- Mon 14th at 11:30, 12:30 & 20:30

ABOUT GIBRALTAR

Gibraltar is a British overseas territory located on the southern end of the Iberian Peninsula at the entrance of the Mediterranean, overlooking the Strait of Gibraltar.

The territory itself is a peninsula of 6.843 square kilometres (2.642 sq mi) whose isthmus connects to the north with Spain. The Rock of Gibraltar is the major landmark of the area and gives its name to the densely populated town, home to almost 30,000 Gibraltarians. An Anglo-Dutch force captured Gibraltar in 1704 during the War of the Spanish Succession. The territory was subsequently ceded to Britain by Spain under the Treaty of Utrecht in 1713. The treaty registered the defeat of French ambitions expressed in the wars of Louis XIV and preserved the European system based on the balance of power.



Spain attempted to retake Gibraltar in 1727 and again in 1779, when it entered the American Revolutionary War on the American side as an ally of France. It became an important base for the Royal Navy, which drove the local economy and provided employment for a large portion of the local population. Gibraltar subsequently became a key base for the Royal Navy, first playing an important part prior to the Battle of Trafalgar. Its strategic value increased with the opening of the Suez Canal as it controlled the sea route between the UK and the British Empire east of Suez.

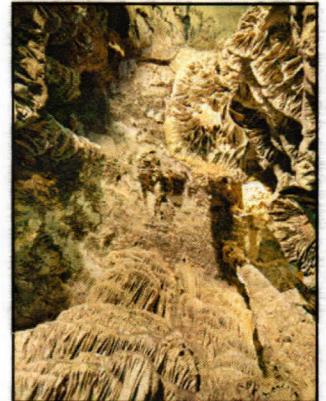
During World War II, Gibraltar's civilian population was evacuated and The Rock was strengthened as a fortress. Spanish dictator Francisco Franco's reluctance to allow the German Army onto Spanish soil frustrated a German plan to capture The Rock, codenamed Operation Felix. In the 1950s, Franco renewed Spain's claim to sovereignty over Gibraltar and restricted movement between Gibraltar and Spain. Gibraltarians voted overwhelmingly to remain under British sovereignty in a 1967 referendum which led to the passing of the Gibraltar Constitution Order in 1969. In response, Spain completely closed the border with Gibraltar and severed all communication links. The border with Spain was partially reopened in 1982, and fully reopened in 1985 prior to Spain's accession into the European Community.

Nowadays, the economy is largely based on tourism, financial services and shipping and the Rock as it is affectionately known throughout the British Commonwealth is most famous for its geology and the Barbary Apes that roam the upper echelons of the Rock itself.

EXCURSIONS

Upper Rock Tour

Throughout the ages the Rock of Gibraltar has been used in turn as a fortress, store room, ammunition dump, gun emplacement, concert hall and air raid shelter. More recently it is home to the Barbary Apes. The Upper Rock Tour is undertaken in air conditioned mini bus complete with tour guide and includes seven main points of interest en route including The Great Siege Tunnels, The Moorish Castle, St Michaels Cave (*right*), the Pillars of Hercules, Europa Point, the 100 ton Gun & the Apes Den. Perhaps the most impressive feature of the Rock lies within in it at St Michaels Cave, a natural grotto that was converted to a hospital in World War II. Nowadays it is a unique auditorium hosting many of the finest Orchestras from across the world. The Great Siege Tunnels were excavated by hand during the siege of 1779 - 83. The tunnels were hewn from rock with the simplest of tools and gunpowder to build a fortress inside the rock.

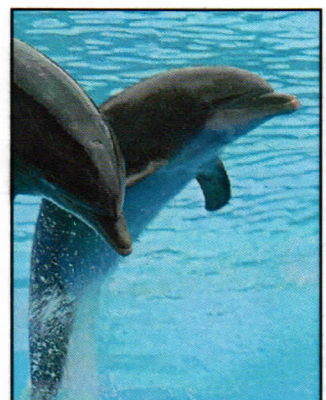

Gibraltar is famous the world over for its thriving population of dolphins. They are attracted to the area by the deep, clean, nutrient rich water, which provides these hungry predators with a constant supply of good quality food. The common dolphin, recognised by its hour glass pattern along the side of its body, is known for its inquisitive, playful behaviour. This friendly dolphin will normally approach the boat to surf in the waves that are created as the boat moves slowly through the water. The Striped dolphin is more slender and is often found swimming, playing and hunting with the common dolphin. Gibraltar is also home to some of the biggest bottlenose dolphins in the world, at 4 metres long these 700 kg mammals thrill passengers with their spectacular, joyful and acrobatic displays just metres away from the boat.

Excursions go out into the Strait of Gibraltar where one can also find many species of whales.

Other Excursions and events include day trips to Spain & Morocco, the opportunity to enjoy lunch aboard a luxury yacht and a series of theme evenings in the bars and restaurants of Gibraltar
